## Your Greyhound's Health Keeping your Greyhound's Teeth Healthy by Dr. Debi Wallinford DVM

They say the eyes are windows to the soul. On a similar note, good oral health is the door to good general health in your grey-hound. And if you've owned a greyhound over 3 years old you probably also know good oral health can be difficult to come by.

First, let's understand dental disease. There are 4 stages of periodontal disease that range from gingivitis (inflammation of the gums secondary to plaque buildup) to advanced tooth and bone loss often including blood and pus. Many teeth in the advanced stage are permanently damaged and unsalvageable and must be extracted for the health of the patient. All stages of periodontal disease can continued on page 2

have secondary effects on the condition of the heart, liver and kidneys.

You may be wondering what can be done to improve your greyhound's oral health and to spare or at least minimize progressive dental disease. The answer is, of course, to brush daily. And while you're at it, could you slip in a few flossings a week? In a perfect world that is exactly what would happen, but if you're like most people, it's easier said than done. Fortunately, there are options... One of my favorites is a plaque prevention gel made by Merial called Oravet. It is an inexpensive, weekly at-home application that prevents the plaque that causes gingivitis. It can be spread on in about a minute which means that you can help arrest dental problems for less than one hour per year. Oravet works best when initiated on clean teeth but will assist in fighting plaque on teeth with mild tartar. It is available through veterinarians everywhere. Another option is to use dental hygiene tools such as dental chews and oral rinses. A good brand is called C.E.T. by Virbac and can be found at your vet. They also manufacture quality toothbrushes and toothpastes. There are also specific diets such as Hills t/d that also aid in preventing tartar formation.

The latest development in the market of oral hygiene is a vaccine from Pfizer Animal Health called Porphyromonas Bacterin. It is designed to impede the growth of the 4 main types of pigmented bacteria that cause plaque in the canine mouth. It is administered in a series of two vaccines three weeks apart. If your greyhound has poor oral health requiring frequent professional cleanings, this may be the vaccine for you.

If all else fails, professional cleaning by your veterinarian is warranted. It is important to have your dog anesthetized for this procedure as an ultrasonic scaler will be used up underneath the gumline to remove large amounts of tartar not visible on physical exam. Many owners are concerned about the breed's sensitivity to anesthesia, but barbiturates are rarely used in this day and age. More commonly used are Ketamine, Valium, and Propofol – all good anesthetic agents in greyhounds and it is acceptable to inquire which will be utilized in your dog. While anesthesia is always a risk in any patient – not just greyhounds –treatment of dental disease and therefore general health—not to mention chronic mouth pain--must be duly considered.

There are many options in the world of canine oral health. Although our chosen breed is not known for having naturally-occurring great oral hygiene, it is up to us as greyhound owners to accept responsibility for the condition of our dogs' mouths. Prevention is key to proper greyhound health and to keeping that door to your grey's general health wide open.



# Dearly missed by Cathy, Jack, Mike, Sam and Dan Munro



Bothell Pet Hospital ran xrays and found a suspicious mass near the breaks. She broke both leg bones just above the wrist joint on her right leg. The radiologist called Bothell this morning with the bad news. Dr. Kovar called me and I rushed over to help her over the Bridge. We lost Jae just 22 days ago to Osteo. I guess Rose missed her too much.

Rose used to "bay" in the middle of the night while dreaming which in turn got all the dogs a'roo-ing. I never got upset about being woken up to this wonderful call of the wild, unless it went on too long, then I'd try to quiet them all down. Fortunately, none of our family or neighbors ever complained about waking up in such a manner.

Daughter of Wigwam Wag and Granddaughter of Dutch Bahama, Jae (pronounced "Jay") was a confident, fun girl who cockroached more than any dog I've ever met. Toby, the dog we often dog sit, is a close second. We've fostered between 50 to 75 dogs over the years (I've truly lost count) so we've seen a few. None of them cockroached as often as she did.

Jae's race name was SA Jae but her tattoos led us to find out that

she was a littermate of Gable Sarah with four other siblings. We've corresponded with Sarah's owner over the years. The connections these greyhounds give us are never less than amazing sometimes. Jae broke her leg in a training run and never raced. Her left front leg was crooked as a result of treating it with vet wrap casts. I truly believe that the trainer did what she could. Jae survived to go on and experience retired life and true love. We were told over the years that she might get arthritis in her leg but it was osteosarcoma that claimed her leg and her life in the end. Jae also battled tick disease from the time we adopted her at Houndraiser on October 15, 2000 until the day she died. No matter what we did, her Ehrlichia titer didn't clear. For a time, we thought that perhaps we were dealing with an Ehrlichia induced bone infection. A last ditch effort of a heavy dose of Doxycycline was started but it didn't help. We'd like to thank John and Lorean Love for all the help, advice, good info and especially for their tick testing clinics over the years to monitor how she was doing. The Loves often told me that were it not for tick testing Jae over the years and her various treatments, we would have lost her much sooner.

We have so many wonderful memories associated with Jae, I won't take up space here talking about them all. She liked to gently walk up your body when invited, drape both front legs over your shoulders and gently give kisses. She had ESP too. She'd sit for a treat before you'd think of giving one to her.:) She sat and stared adoringly at Midge Moore at Country Village (twice, on two different occasions) while she ate her sandwich, hoping for a handout. I don't think Jae blinked or got out of her sit position until the last bite of sandwich disappeared, or Midge finished handing Jae bits of her sandwich.

Jae was diagnosed with osteosarcoma on July 6, 2006. She nearly made it six months and could have gone longer but she was giving us signs that she was ready to go. Since the famous windstorm and blackout on December 14th, her condition had declined. Her limp got worse and her confidence seemed a bit off as far as her place in the pack. She would wait for all the dogs to go inside before she would come in to avoid running into them. She was changing beds quite often at night. Even though she wouldn't complain, I had a feeling that she was in pain and was having problems getting comfortable. Modern day pain medication is wonderful and it certainly helped her but we couldn't live with ourselves if she broke her leg and the dogs packed her. It was better for her to leave us with dignity.

We had the good fortune to have six months to say a long goodbye to Jae. She walked with me every day right up to the day before we let her go. Oh, the walks got shorter as time went by. Sometimes, I had to give her a treat to get her out of the driveway. As I think back on it, I think I taught her it was good to stop walking so she could get a treat rather than encouraging her to walk. :) Maybe the owner wasn't very smart afterall. During our walks, I was always amused at how her limp would go away when she saw a squirrel.

Go in peace, sweet Jae. Thank you for all the lessons we learned through your life and for living and dying with grace and dignity.

## SUMMER TIME TIPS

The summer season is approaching and a number of areas have already had some quite warm days. As we head into the warmer weather, here are a few tips to keep our pups safe:

- Remember that pavement, especially black top, gets very hot so you need to be careful walking your pup on the hot surfaces so they don't burn their pads.
- Check the screens on your windows and doors. In the
  past we've had dogs try to escape out of windows
  without screens, even on the second floor. Remember
  that a screen (door or window) will NOT keep in a
  high prey drive dog or one that finds something of
  great interest on the other side!
- Don't leave your dog in a parked car unattended (even with the windows open). The temperature in a car can climb very quickly even on a 60 degree day.
- Take water with you when you are walking/running your greyhound(s). Greyhounds can quickly overheat with their lower body fat. Try and walk or run in the cooler times of the day.
- Always carry large containers of water and a bowl in your vehicle at all times. Also keep some towels in your vehicle so you can soak them in water and put them over your greyhound if they start to overheat. Keep the towels wet so they don't start to warm your greyhound rather than cool them. Spray bottles of water can also help.
- Double check your gates and locks and make sure they are secure.
- Don't leave your dog in your yard while you are gone.
- Always make sure your dog(s) have cool, fresh, clean
- Know the signs of hyperthermia and how to prevent and treat it.

Some of the signs of hyperthermia are:

- Noisy breathing that may indicate upper airway obstruction
- Excessive panting or rapid panting
- Bright red mucous membranes (gums, conjunctiva of the eyes)
- Weakness or dizziness
- Diarrhea
- Shock
- Vomiting sometimes with blood
- Collapse
- Coma
